1. The Month of May:

Pope Francis has asked that, during the Month of May, the Rosary should be recited in the Church right across the World in the context of the coronavirus and its effects. As a Parish we will be doing ours via ZOOM at 10.00am on Sundays. You are welcome to join. Thereafter we start the Holy Mass at 10.30am.

2. The Holy Mass:

The Holy Mass is the highest form of worship on Earth, there are many fruits and graces that result from having a Mass offered for you. **Masses offered for still-living persons (including yourself) are more beneficial than Masses offered for deceased persons. Masses for the dead will provide for them a God-assigned “indulgence” (a curtailing of the duration and/or intensity of purgatorial suffering). But if Mass is offered as intercession for persons while still alive and in the state of grace—i.e., no unrepented serious sin (1 John 5:16), these living persons receive three added benefits not available to the dead, namely:**

- Increase of merit (assigned heavenly joy and glory) forever —Catechism of the Catholic Church [CCC] 2010).
- Added sanctifying grace (a deeper sharing in the life of God—2 Pet. 1:4).
- Actual graces (conscience-nudges to do good and avoid evil—CCC 2000).
- Finally, St Anselm, St Leonard of Port Maurice and Pope Benedict XVI have individually said that Masses offered for persons in their lifetime are far more beneficial. From time to time ask your priest to offer the Holy Mass for you or someone else including the dead. **There is no price tag on the Mass, (no one can buy the Mass) however, if you are able to give, it is customary to give an offering when requesting a Mass for an intention. That stipend goes to support our Parish work.**

3. Parish Finances

Parishioners have asked how they can help reduce our income loss during the pandemic. Thank you for this kindness, particularly as personal finances are a concern for a lot of people at the moment. There are a few ways you can support the parish:

1. Continue to put your offering in your gift envelopes each week. When we return from lockdown place the envelopes on the plate. If you prefer, pass them to Fr Joel or Paul periodically (see below);
2. Make a donation – cheques and cash can be passed to Father Joel (The Rectory, Melbourne) or Paul Boshell (10 Cheribough Road, Castle Donington). Please write on the envelope your name, indicate it’s a donation and whether it can be given under Gift Aid. You don’t need a special envelope;
3. Make an on-line donation or a regular gift. Please put your name and state “donation” in the reference.

8. Advice on using Zoom

I think we are all finding it strange using this technology for our collective worship. It is an abnormal situation but it can help bridge the gap until life returns to normality. The following tips may help you to get the most out of a "ZOOM" Mass

- Remember that your microphone is very sensitive and others are likely to hear every sound – from turning pages to whispers. Obviously it is best if your house is quiet but not everyone can manage that, so muting the microphone unless you are reading can help. The switch for this is a microphone symbols usually in the bottom left of your screen
- You may also find that you can follow the prayers more easily if you mute the microphone when everyone is speaking
- Not everyone wants to appear on video early in the day – or even later. It is perfectly acceptable to switch your video off
- It can help if the priest or the current reader is most prominent on your screen. If you right click on Father Joel's image you can select "Pin Speaker" and his image will fill your screen.
